That year, Boston became the first city to celebrate Disability Pride Day with a parade. Since then, cities across the country have followed suit with marches, pageants and parades. Disability Pride Month has celebrated disabled people, their identities and culture, and their contributions to society. It also seeks to change the way people think about and define disability, to end the stigma

* Class of 2023 Honored During Commencement — North's class of 2023 was honored during the Seattle Colleges commencement ceremony June 22 at T-Mobile Park in Seattle. Some 939 graduates completed their programs and earned a degree or certificate during a time in which students have faced many challenges, not the least of which was a global pandemic that drastically changed the way the college community taught and learned over the pat three years. - * NSC Faculty Vote to Adopt Uniform Grade Scale North faculty voted to adopt a common percentage-to-decimal grade conversion chart for college-wide use beginning fall quarter 2023. North's Curriculum and Academic Standards (CAS) committee recommended approval of the faculty's decision, and in May it was approved by Pete Lortz, vice president for Instruction. The new chart aligns with recently adopted charts by North's sister colleges, Seattle Central College and South Seattle College. Learn more.
- * Summer Hours for Student-Facing Services Summer hours for North's student-facing services are in effect and continue through Sept. 1. In-person services are available Monday through Thursday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., and virtual services are available Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Friday from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. In addition, Admissions, Advising, Enrollment Services and Workforce Education Funding will be available virtually until 7 p.m. on Tuesdays. * Latine Mural Unveiled on Campus – An inspiring new mural was recently unveiled during a June 14 celebration. Designed by Seattle-based Mexican-American artist and illustrator Grace Gonzalez, the mural, Blooms of Change, was painted by art students and is located on the Opportunity Center building on the south end of the NSC campus. Kelda Martensen, NSC Visual Art faculty and co-chair of the college's art council, credited the student muralists with bringing Gonzalez's vision to life. "The students did a stunning job painting this amazing mural," Martensen said. "They not only painted it, but they also rendered, budgeted and drew up their own mural proposals as

part of the course. This experience will serve them well going forward." - * Students Receive Certification as Certified Fiber Optics Technician Eleven students from the Introduction to Fiber Optics class (EET 108) completed the Certified Fiber Optics Technician Certification (CFOT) in spring quarter. The CFOT is provided through the Fiber Optics Association, which is chartered to promote fiber optics through education, certification, and standards. The CFOT certification includes passing an intensive exam, as well as 10 weeks of hands-on training addressing skill sets required of fiber optics technicians using state of the art test equipment. This training is made possible by generous funding from federal and state grants as well as student lab fees.
- * DSP Tool for Students Launched at End of Spring Quarter The math-directed self-placement (DSP) tool launched at the end of spring quarter. The DSP marks a significant change for students, where instead of being placed into their appropriate level of math using high stakes tests, students are being placed based on a tool where they get to explore what types of questions/materials they would encounter and then make an informed decision. This will help with the goal of increasing students' progression through math. In addition, DSP is incredibly important for BIPOC students, as high stakes testing disproportionally affects BIPOC students negatively.
- * Renewal of Johnson Controls Grant to Focus on Retention of Underrepresented Students The Johnson Controls grant in the amount of \$100,000, administered through the Seattle Colleges Foundation, has been renewed for fiscal year 2023-24. The grant will be focused on improving retention of underrepresented students. Funds will be used to partially fund a full-time electronics navigator role, provide paid teaching and lab assistant opportunities for students, and provide \$30,000 in scholarships to currently enrolled electronics students with the goal of encouraging persistence in the program. For the 2022-23 academic year, nine Electronics students were awarded \$2,150 scholarships from Johnson Controls for a total of \$19,350.
- * Students Present at Consortium Capstone Showcase Event For the first time, NSC Application Development (AD) Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) students joined a consortium capstone showcase event held at Northeastern University in South Lake Union. Three groups from the AD BAS capstone/internship course were chosen to present their final project to faculty and students from other community and technical colleges, as well as industry professionals. This was a great opportunity for students to share their hard work on a chosen capstone project and to address

both technical and non-technical questions and challenges. An opportunity to network upon completion of final presentations was also provided.

- * Archaeology Field School Investigates NSC Site for Second Year This month, North students are partnering with Edmonds College students on an archaeological dig on campus at the site of remnants of the Kumasaka Farmhouse and Green Lake Gardens Co. The location, near the southbound lanes of I-5 and the pedestrian bridge, consists of residential and greenhouse debris and infrastructure associated with a first-generation Japanese-American family. This is the second year at the site, and the focus of the excavation will be the pre-World War II community center and outbuilding. - * Construction Updates Here is an update on current projects:
 - <u>Library</u> Furniture delivery continues and installation of book stacks is currently progressing.
 Facilities is targeting mid-July for the college to start accessing the third and second floors for installing books, IT equipment, etc. Access to the first level is targeted for August. Substantial completion is scheduled for the second week in September.
 - <u>Classroom Renovations</u> This project is complete and new furniture has been delivered.
 - <u>Facilities Update</u> Facilities has contracted weith SSW Architectural Services for assistance in preparing for the Facilities Condition Survey. The facility walk-through with the state board is scheduled for July 12.



* Coming Soon to North – North is excited to welcome Black Coffee Northwest, which will be opening a new location in the old Espresso Lounge area on the first floor of the College Center building. Opening this summer (date to be announced soon), North students get the credit for starting the work to bring Black Coffee NW to campus.
