# **DID YOU KNOW?**

\* August 2023 Has Two Full Moons – Yes, it's true! The first full moon in August, called the Sturgeon Moon, rose on Aug. 1, according to the Farmers' Almanac. This full moon got its name from the prehistoric-looking sturgeon fish, found in the Great Lakes and Lake Champlain. The second full moon of August – a Blue Moon – will happen Wednesday, Aug. 30. Both are supermoons, the kind closest to earth, making them appear much bigger in the sky than usual. After these two supermoons, the last supermoon of 2023 will be in September.

\* Archaeological Field School Reveals Japanese American History – In July, North students partnered with Edmonds College students on an archaeological dig on campus at the site of remnants of the Kumasaka Farmhouse and Green Lake Gardens Co. The location, near the southbound lanes of I-5 and the pedestrian bridge, consists of residential and greenhouse debris and infrastructure associated with a first-generation Japanese-American family.
