* Universal Human Rights Month – On Dec. 10, 1948, the General Assembly of the United Nations outlined the basic rights and fundamental freedoms to which we are entitled. Two years later, on Dec. 2, 1950, the General Assembly invited all member states and interested organizations to celebrate Human Rights Day. Then, on Dec. 9, 2001, President George W. Bush declared the



first Human Rights Week, which has since become a monthlong worldwide observance. It is meant as a time to reflect on the way we treat others, and to do what we can in the fight for equality, especially in a time when topics such as systemic racism are widely being addressed. decided to pivot and go into Engineering at NSC. Leah was part of a small group of students who helped develop the college's first Rocketry Club with instructors Tracy Furutani and Mike Steffancin. Her journey has taken her to NASA's Community College Aerospace Scholars Program, Western Washington University and Cornell University, where she is working on a PhD in Robotics. Learn more.

NSC students Vlad Andral, Computer Science and LSAMP student; Sebastian Rios, Engineering and LSAMP student; Riko Niyomwungere, Computer Science student and LSAMP alum; and Zane Schaffer, Computer Science student, participated in the NASA Space Apps Challenge Oct. 7-8. Their project, Moon Glow, won the award for Best Use of Technology, which was awarded to the project that exemplified the most innovative use of technology.

- * College in the High School Receives Accreditation The College in the High School program at North received state accreditation through 2026 and will be applying for national accreditation this year from the National Association of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships. NSC offers ENGL& 101, ENGL& 111, ENGL 151, and AME 151 through the program. This program has a proven record of serving historically underrepresented students and serves as a pathway into college for these students.
- * LSAMP Students Attend SACNAS Conference Nine LSAMP students attended the Society for the Advancement of Chicanos/Hispanics and Native Americans in Science (SACNAS) conference in Portland, Oregon, Oct. 26-28. Two of the students presented their research at the conference. The SACNAS conference is the nation's largest multidisciplinary and multicultural STEM conference in the country. The program is a great place for Black and Brown students to present and engage in discourse around STEM, build important networks, and gain professional and academic skills. Most importantly, given the vision and values of the conference, the program helps augment students' STEM identities.

- * Black Coffee Northwest in Seattle Chamber Spotlight Black Coffee Northwest, which opened a coffee shop this fall on the first floor of the College Center building, was recently spotlighted by the Seattle Chamber of Commerce as a Community Connector-Served Business. The article features owner Darnesha Weary and the community focus that makes Black Coffee Northwest distinct. Darnesha was born and raised in the Seattle area and started a coffee shop in 2020 to support her nonprofit called Grounded, which serves the greater King County area while supporting youth and young adults with employment and training opportunities, after-school enrichment activities and mental health support. Black Coffee Northwest was just selected to receive a \$100,000 Racism as a Public Health Crisis Grant from King County. Learn more.
- * City Seeks Feedback on Northgate Plan – Northgate is one of five urban centers in the City of Seattle undergoing a planning process that will define a community vision and develop neighborhood-specific policies for public services, transportation, economy, housing and land use. The city is seeking broad



community engagement and North Seattle College is one of the sites where feedback is being collected. An interactive poster (see photo) is located on the first floor of the College Center building in the east-west passageway next to the bulletin board. * Volunteers Needed to Help Combat Hunger — As hunger and food insecurity continue to grow nationwide and throughout our area, the NSC Food Pantry is seeking volunteers to help keep this operation going strong. A recent survey showed 36% of students at North reported experiencing food insecurity. One way North works to meet this need is through a weekly pop-up food pantry and grocery delivery program. This partnership between North, the United Way of King County and the University District Food Bank happens every Tuesday at the east entrance of the campus parking garage. - * Make Sure You Receive Emergency Alerts As we move into the winter months and inclement weather is more of a threat to close campus or delay starting times, it is important that all of us have up-to-date contact information in the SeattleCollegesAlerts system. The system, known as RAVE, is the primary and official notification system used across Seattle Colleges to notify students, faculty, and staff of weather and other emergencies. By default, all staff, faculty, and students will receive emails through the system. It is recommended you opt in for text and phone messages to your mobile device for alerts regarding closures and potential emergencies.
