* **LSAMP hosts STEM Undergraduate Fair at NSC** – The Louis Stokes Alliances for Minority Participation (LSAMP) program hosted the STEM Undergraduate Research Fair at NSC on Nov. 9, where approximately 160 students attended. The purpose of the fair was to connect students to local research groups and opportunities at the University of Washington (UW) and NSC. Groups present included the NSC Undergraduate Research course (UGR 294), UW Center for Integration of Modern Optoelectronic Materials on Demand, UW Molecular Engineering Materials Center, UW College of the Environment, UW Office of Undergraduate Research, NSC Rocketry Club, and others. The idea for the event was spearheaded by Deserée Lai, an NSC alum who is now studying condensed matter physics at UW. The event aligns with LSAMP's vision to establish a culture that supports, promotes, and enhances STEM research.

* Aerospace Grant Application Approved – The Aerospace High Demand 1,000 FTEs redistribution grant application for 23-24 has been approved in the amount of \$120,000 per year for at least three years, with the possibility of sustained funding if NSC reaches FTE goals for the Electronics programs. The funding will be used to support outreach and innovation for the Electronics program, with focused energy on vitalizing and innovating the IT-Controlled Electronics program.

* **ECE Scholarship Fund Established** – NSC's Early Childhood Education (ECE) team, in partnership with the Seattle Colleges Foundation, has established its own scholarship fund to

support ECE students, with a special emphasis on students in its language immersion cohorts. The fund is supported by faculty/staff donors and their network. The team will make its first awards in Spring 2024 with a plan to award more than 25 small scholarships.

* Early Childhood Education Program Partnership with DEEL – The Seattle City Department of Education and Early Learning (DEEL) and the NSC ECE team initiated a new partnership in July 2023 for an ECE Point of Contact, based at North, to serve its scholarship students at early learning programs throughout the city. In its first five months, the partnership resulted in 16 students receiving admission and/or retention support, and DEEL sending an announcement on these positive outcomes to be publicly shared with the Seattle Mayor's Office.

* City Seeks Feedback on Northgate Plan – Northgate is one of five urban centers in the City of Seattle undergoing a planning process that will define a community vision and develop neighborhood-specific policies for public services, transportation, economy, housing and land use. The city is seeking broad community engagement and North Seattle College is one of the sites where feedback is being collected. An interactive poster is located on the first floor of the College Center building in the east-west passageway next to the bulletin board. So, next time you stop by Black Coffee Northwest, be sure to chime in and share your experiences with the neighborhood to help create a refreshed vision for Northgate. Learn more.
