\* March is Expanding Girls' Horizons in Science and Engineering Month – The month of March is all about helping young girls develop more interest in science, technology,

engineering and mathematics (STEM) throughout their educational careers. STEM workers play an important role in America's innovative capacity and global competitiveness. They are our engineers, scientists, doctors, sociologists and analysts. Although the gender gap in STEM has been closing in recent years, there is still a significant underrepresentation of women in these fields. According to the National Science Foundation, women make up only 28% of the workforce in science and

\* Groundbreaking of New Fire Station 31 in North Seattle – On Feb. 5, Mayor Bruce Harrell joined the Seattle Fire Department, Department of Finance and Administrative Services, and city and community leaders to break ground on the future site of Fire Station 31 in North Seattle. Construction of the new 22,000 square foot station located at 11302 Meridian Ave. N. is under way and is slated to be complete in late 2025. The new site is designed to meet the growing operational needs of Seattle Fire and the response times of the growing North Seattle community. - \* International Women's Day Panel March 5 The Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander Serving Institution (AANAPISI) is presenting *Celebrating North Seattle College Asian Women Leaders Panel* from 3 to 4 p.m., Tuesday, March 5, via Zoom. In this panel, Interim President **Dr. Rachel Solemsaas**, Faculty Counselor **Jenny Mao** and Dean of Workforce Instruction **Melana Yanos** will share their journeys, stories and advice as Asian women leaders in higher education. - \* Jazz Ensemble Concert March 13 Bring the whole family to the Grove on Wednesday, March 13, for the Jazz Ensemble Concert beginning at 8 p.m. This live student performance will be directed by **Fred Radke** of North's Continuing Education faculty. Admission is free.
- \* College in the High School Sees High Enrollment In fall 2023, North's College in the High School (CHS) program had more than 450 students enrolled in year-long and fall semester courses. The CHS program has seven participating schools: Ingraham High School, Nathan Hale High School, Lincoln High School, West Seattle High School, Mercer Island High School, The Center School, and Sno-Isle Tech Center. There are currently six North faculty members working with high school teachers on the following courses: ENGL 101, ENGL 111, JAPN 121, JAPN 122, ENGL 151, AME 151, and multiple Pharmacy Technician classes. In discussion for 2024-2025 are HIST 147 and HIST 148 at Ballard High School and MATH 151 at Nathan Hale. CHS offers an alternative to Running Start, in which capable high school students may take college-level courses while remaining at their high school. Research from the Community College Research Center shows CHS programs typically serve a different population than Running Start students, tending more toward first-generation students and students of color.
- \* North's CHS Program Seeks Accreditation Last December, North Seattle College submitted a letter of intent to apply for accreditation from the National Association of

Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP) for the College in the High School (CHS) program. The letter of intent has been accepted, and the application is in process, due for submission by June. NACEP accreditation for CHS programs is required by Washington state by the 2027-2028 academic year. North's application will be reviewed during 2024-2025, with a virtual site visit from NACEP during the spring 2025. If the application is approved, NSC will be accredited by NACEP for fall 2025.

\* Discover Events Coming to North – Save the dates for the 2024 Discover Seattle Colleges series. For several years now, Discover Seattle Colleges events have provided prospective students with firsthand information and guidance on opportunities at the three district colleges, including North Seattle College. This year, there are three facets to Discover: online events, open houses and field trips. North's open house is scheduled from 3:30 to 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, March 14, in the Grove. - \* Launch of WABEL Fellowship Efforts are underway to launch the Workforce Accounting and Business Experiential Learning (WABEL) fellowship in Spring 2024. This fellowship provides students in Accounting and Business programs that require internships with stipends for completing unpaid internship experiences. The hope is that this will encourage and incentivize more students to pursue work-based learning opportunities for North's Accounting and Business programs. This pilot program is funded by RAP Invest in the Future funding, which received \$40,000 for its proposal.
- \* NSC Launches Unpaid Tuition Campaign North staff from Enrollment Services, Communications, Title III, Workforce Education, Financial Aid, and Cashiering, along with District Communications, have been working together to send out email and text messages to students owing tuition in order to provide financial resources. For the 2023-2024 school year, additional emergency funding from the CARES Lost Revenue fund has been allocated by NSC's Cabinet. More than 65 students have applied for this funding this academic year with the goal of awarding more than \$300,000 in emergency funding. Prior emergency funding has seen more than 70% awarded to students of color with more than 50% of these students enrolling for the following quarter.
- \* Food Trucks on Campus Two Days a Week North is hosting food trucks twice a week on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the parking lot just east of the Roy Flores Wellness Center. The food trucks are part of North's efforts to expand food options on campus. For the current food truck schedule, visit the Washington State Food Truck Association website.
