DID YOU KNOW?

* May is Asian and Pacific American Heritage Month – Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month is a celebration of Asians and Pacific Islanders in the United States. A rather broad term, Asian/Pacific encompasses all of the Asian continent and the Pacific islands of Melanesia (New Guinea, New Caledonia, Vanuatu, Fiji and the Solomon Islands), Micronesia (Marianas, Guam, Wake Island, Palau,



Marshall Islands, Kiribati, Nauru and the Federated States of Micronesia) and Polynesia (New Zealand, Hawaiian Islands, Rotuma, Midway Islands, Samoa, American Samoa, Tonga, Tuvalu, Cook Islands, French Polynesia and Easter Island). The month of May was chosen to commemorate the immigration of the first Japanese to the United States on May 7, 1843, and to mark the anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869. The majority of workers who laid the tracks were Chinese immigrants. Learn more.

This year, the mural is celebrating the life, work and activism of James Baldwin. The students are working with the design of professional artist Yvonne Ferguson, while learning the steps of mural execution, budgeting, design and the role of community engagement. * NSC Partnership with Workforce Development Council – As part of a 10-month guaranteed basic income pilot program, the Workforce Development Council of Seattle-King

County (WDC) worked with North to recruit students in financial need who are underrepresented in technology fields. The program provided the students \$500 a month. Outcomes of the pilot show 100% retention and completion rates for program participants, and 100% of the participants responded that the funding helped them to remain enrolled. One of the participants, Riberiko Niyomwungere, a North Computer Science student, spoke about his experience with receiving the funding and was featured in the Seattle Times and KUOW.

- * Bloodborne Pathogens, Hazardous Materials Training Sessions Bloodborne pathogens training is required for any employee who can reasonably encounter blood or bodily fluids in the workplace (i.e., accident or illness). This is an annually required training and covers the diseases from bodily fluid contact, prevention and cleanup protocols. You may sign up for training, which is scheduled for Wednesday, May 8, at 8 a.m. Hazardous materials training is available for anyone at Seattle Colleges working with hazardous materials as part of their job. It will teach how to read labels and go over personal protective equipment requirements and emergency response procedures for certain chemical spills.
