DID YOU KNOW?

* Juneteenth National Independence Day is June 19 — Juneteenth, officially Juneteenth National Independence Day, is a federal holiday celebrated annually on June 19 to commemorate the ending of slavery. The holiday's name is a blend of the words "June" and "nineteenth," as it was on June



19, 1865, when Maj. Gen. Gordon Granger ordered the final enforcement of the Emancipation Proclamation in Texas at the end of the American Civil War. Early celebrations date back to 1866, at first involving church-centered community gatherings in Texas. The day was recognized as a federal holiday in 2021, when President Joe Biden signed the Juneteenth National Independence Day Act into law. Juneteenth became the first new federal holiday since Martin Luther King Jr. Day was adopted in 1983. <u>Learn more</u>.

on Canvas); **Justin Gregg**, *Bananas* (Stoneware); **Liliana Gutierrez-Pino**, *Stretch* (Digital Illustration); **Michelle Carranza Velasco**, *El Gallo* (Collagraph); **Othello Smith**, *Fruity* (Charcoal on Paper); and **Tamsin Gillie**, *Still Life #2* (Charcoal on Paper). Entries awarded first-place in the Fiction, Essay, Poetry and Drama categories advance to the international competition. - * Service Awards Ceremony June 5 Join your friends and colleagues in a celebration recognizing employees with five, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 40 and 45 years of service at North. The in-person ceremony will also feature recognition of employees' awards, STARS' announcement of the Classified Employee of the Year and recognition of retirees. The event is from 2 to 3:30 p.m., this Wednesday, June 5, in the North Star Dining Room (CC1254B).
- * Workforce Development Grant for IT Program Expansion North was awarded the Workforce Development Grant from the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges for expansion of work happening in the college's Information Technology (IT) programs. This includes pursuit of Center for Academic Excellence Cyber Defense designation, expansion of the I-BEST IT pathways, and piloting IT student stipends for unpaid work-based learning. The total amount of the award is \$137,910 of one-time funds for fiscal year 2024-25. This work is a collaborative effort between Workforce Instruction and Basic and Transitional Studies.
- * SBCTC Trustees Pass Resolution for Thunderbird Nest Project on Campus Last month, the State Board of Community and Technical Colleges Board of Trustees passed a resolution allowing North to sell surplus property for affordable housing serving the Native American community. North can now enter into a purchase and sale agreement for 2.3 acres of its surplus land to Bellwether and Chief Seattle Club as part of their Thunderbird Nest project. The project



includes a 5,700-square-foot building for North's use that is intended to serve as an intellectual house or an educational resource to enhance services for our Native American and Indigenous communities. An NSC Tribal Advisory Council has been established to help guide North's

commitment and actions as an indigenous-serving college. The first meeting is June 6 and members include student **Chayton Remle**; alumni representative **Audrey Remle**; faculty **Elizabeth Goulet**, **Cristobal Borges** and **Renee Alma**; staff **Lareina Redwoman**; and community members **Willard Bill**, **Jr.**, and **Elsie Bill** with Native American and Indigenous descent.

- * MLTV Set for June 5 in Library Building This year's Making Teaching and Learning Visible (MLTV) symposium of student learning will be this Wednesday, June 5, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., in the Library building. MLTV is North's annual symposium where students, faculty and staff can share the work they have been developing in the form of poster displays, readings, performances, panel discussions or other creative forms of expression. MLTV will be celebrating the life and work of writer and activist James Baldwin with a film screening at 11 a.m. in the auditorium, followed at noon by a panel discussion featuring English Faculty Laura McCracken and Ben Wirth; Equity, Diversity, Inclusion and Community Director Dr. Cooper Sealy; Project Baldwin Director Julius Lloyd; and a Project Baldwin student participant.
- * Two Concerts Coming in New Auditorium Two concerts are coming in the next week in North's new auditorium in the Library building. At 8 p.m. on Wednesday, June 5, the NSC Jazz Band with Fred Radke will be performing; and at 3 p.m. on Sunday, June 9, the North Seattle Symphonic Band will be featured. - * James Baldwin Mural Unveiled June 12 in Library At noon on Wednesday, June 12, the new mural celebrating the life, work and activism of James Baldwin will be unveiled on the third floor of the Library. Martensen. The students have been working with the design of professional artist <u>Yvonne Ferguson</u>, while learning the steps of mural execution, budgeting, design and the role of community engagement. - * Summer and Fall Guided Pathways 100 Day Projects The Title III grant and Guided Pathways funds have limited faculty stipend and student funds available for Guided Pathways redesign projects. Projects must be completed within a 100-day period during the summer (ending by Aug. 16) or the fall quarter. Awards range from \$50 to \$5,000.
