- * NSF Tabs North for Two Innovative Projects to Advance STEM Education The U.S. National Science Foundation (NSF) is investing \$14.5 million in the inaugural set of awards through its Innovation in Two-Year College in STEM Education (ITYC) program, and North will play a key role in delivering on that effort. The college is participating in two of the 35 projects awarded by the NSF, which went to institutions in 18 states and the District of Columbia. One project is a summer bridge program led by biology faculty member **Ann Murkowski** (principal investigator) and chemistry faculty member **Dr. Heather Price** (co-principal investigator). The other project is focused on incorporating climate justice and civic engagement in undergraduate STEM led by Dr. Price (co-principal investigator) and Dr. Sonya Doucette (principal investigator) of Bellevue College. This work grew out of an existing grant project Drs. Price and Doucette will complete this month (Enhancing Community College STEM Teaching through Faculty Development). Of note, ITYC is a new program at the NSF developed and led by **Dr. Kalyn Owens**, a chemistry faculty member at North who is currently serving as a rotating program officer at the NSF. Learn more.

- * 'Unbeatable Diana Ma' Says Stories Have Always Been in Her Diana Ma, professor of English and creative writing at North, where she has taught for more than 25 years, was recently featured in the Seattle Colleges Foundation's College Minute newsletter. The feature focused on Diana's story-telling ability, her inspiration and her books. "From my earliest memory, I've always had stories in me," Diana said. "My mind populated with characters, worlds, fantasies; I'd get lost in another world." Currently on a one-year sabbatical, she has another book, Rainbow Fair, which is set for release next April.

 Spanish, Arabic, Somali and Mandarin languages. The
 work focuses on anti-bias education, piloting community-



based cohorts for ECE providers across the state, and creating supported education pathways for the workforce, from entry level through graduate school. The grant has supported the Noris E. - * NSC Receives Additional Funding from Johnson Controls North received a \$100,000 grant renewal, for a total award of \$300,000, as part of the Johnson Controls Community College Partnership Program. This funding enhances on-campus training and educational opportunities for future leaders in the HVAC, digital, fire and security industries. NSC, alongside Johnson Controls, remains committed to addressing the skilled trades gap through strategic investments to equip the future skilled trades workforce and foster strong communities.
