* **National Giving Month** – As we enter the holiday season, it is no surprise that December is considered the Month of Giving, revolving around people making a difference in society by helping others. Last year, Americans gave \$410.2 billion to charity, more than ever before. Nearly one third of annual giving occurs in



December and 12% in the last three days of the year. For nonprofit organizations, 28% will raise as much as half of their funding this month. And yet, neither Congress nor the Executive Branch has officially dedicated December or any month to acts of volunteerism or charitable giving. Learn more.

* North EMT Program Receives Grant from Medic One Foundation – NSC's Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) program recently was awarded an equipment grant from the Medic One Foundation to purchase new "Stop the Bleed" wound-packing training aids and automated external defibrillator (AED) trainers. The new wound-packing trainers will allow students to practice and hone their skills in a safe, controlled environment. As for the AED trainers, to be effective in cardiac arrest resuscitation, CPR should be performed with a portable defibrillator until emergency services arrive. Learn more.

* NSC Students Earn National Rocketry Certifications – Congratulations to four Rocketry Club members who achieved National Association of Rocketry certifications during fall quarter. Mohamed Bin Nagi earned Level 2 certification, and Henry Hong and Alan Beem earned Level 1 certifications Sept. 30 at the Tri-Cities Rocketeers launch site in Pasco, Wash.
