* NSC Recognized for Inclusive Excellence and 'Raising the Bar' – As reported in November, North was one of nine colleges in Washington state (and just 200 in the nation) eligible to apply for a new U.S. Department of Education (DOE) award program recognizing inclusive excellence. While North's application was not selected as one of final 10, the college's story was shared on the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities *Beacon* newsletter in an article authored by Dr.

Rachel Solemsaas titled, <u>Raising the Bar to Transform Education: North Seattle College's</u> Mission to Promote Equity and Opportunity for All.

* STEM Research Fair Sees High Attendance – The University of Washington STEM Research Fair was held at North during fall quarter, where 189 students from eight different colleges attended. Attendees consisted of 51% first-generation students, 83% in their first or second year of college, and more than 50% were from demographics that are historically underrepresented in STEM, while 74% want to transfer to UW. Providing opportunities like

these for students is an important piece of their academic journey, as historically underrepresented STEM college students who participate in undergraduate research experiences are 17.4% more likely to persist to graduation. The UW STEM Fair was put together in collaboration between NSC and the UW Office of Undergraduate Research. NSC graduate Deserée Lai is credited with developing the idea of holding a STEM Research Fair at NSC.

- * New Agreement with Firefighters Joint Apprenticeship and Training Committee North has entered into a new agreement to deliver related supplemental instruction for the Washington State Firefighters (WSFF) Joint Apprenticeship and Training Committee (JATC). WSFF JATC apprentices will take related supplemental instruction coursework through available Fire Science courses taught at North. South Seattle College's Georgetown campus works in partnership with North and has been integral in creating the contract and providing operational support for the program.
- * Behind the Scenes of a High-Rise Masterpiece with NSC Real Estate Club North's Real Estate Club recently took an exclusive tour of a stunning high-rise apartment building, and it was nothing short of incredible. This hands-on experience gave students a 360-degree view of what makes a property thrive from the lobby to the penthouse.
