* Black History Month – February is Black History Month and this year's theme is African Americans and Labor, which focuses on the various and profound ways that work and working of all kinds – free and unfree, skilled and unskilled, vocational and voluntary – intersects with the collective experiences of Black people. Indeed, work is at the very center of much of Black history and culture. Be it the traditional agricultural labor of enslaved Africans that fed Low Country colonies, debates among Black

- * English Faculty Member Publishes New Book and Rolls out Workshops Diana Ma, English faculty member, published a new book titled, "Anti-Oppressive Universal Design for Teachers: Building Equitable Classrooms." The new book, which comes out in June, provides a student-centered, culturally responsive blueprint for building sustainable and just educational practices. Ma presents a framework that takes the principles of equity and humanizing pedagogy from anti-oppressive theories and the principles of multiplicity and flexible design from Universal Design Learning (UDL). In addition to the new book, Ma is also offering workshops and consultations on an Anti-oppressive Universal Design framework to schools and other educational institutions.
- * Acting Director Named for Access, Community and Opportunity Jill Lane, who has more than 20 years of experience at North, including serving as acting president in 2023, was recently named acting director of Access, Community and Opportunity. She took over the role from Julius Lloyd, who will continue supporting North as part of the ACO/Project Baldwin team.

Alysen joined North from Lake Washington Institute of Technology. She has worked for several colleges in Washington and brings a wealth of experience and a passion for supporting student success through project and scholarship management.
- * Director of College Access Partnership Named Michelle Cruver, a social impact leader focused on educational equity initiatives, has been named as the new director of College Access Partnerships at North. She brings more than 15 years of designing, launching and facilitating initiatives for educational attainment. Michelle has previously worked at Shoreline Community College, UW Seattle-Bothell and Seattle University.

- * Roy Flores Wellness Center Engagement on Rise The Roy Flores Wellness Center (RFWC) has experienced impressive growth since reopening in fall 2022. The center had a total of 5,197 check-ins in fall quarter 2024, which marks a 39% increase from fall quarter 2023 and a 172% increase from fall quarter 2022 more check-ins than the entire 2022-2023 academic year. More employees are taking advantage of the center with employee memberships increasing by 47% from fall quarter 2023. In February, RFWC will be launching its first campus-wide Wellness Challenge for students, employees, and RFWC members to encourage healthy habits and promote well-being (see related item later in this News Briefs).
