\* Real Estate Club Explores Sammamish Village – North Real Estate Club students recently had an exclusive opportunity to tour Sammamish Village, gaining firsthand insight into the

complexities of owning and managing commercial real estate. With expert guidance, the students saw how real estate professionals excel in property management, business development and client relationships. Learn more.

- \* North Students Collaborate in Meadowbrook Pond Restoration Students in the Environmental Justice Club have been collaborating with Dirt Corps, a community-based ecological restoration program, to learn about various restoration skills in hopes of organizing end-of-year restoration events at North and South Seattle colleges. The latest event took place at Meadowbrook Pond, where students learned how to safely remove English Ivy from trees. The club has also been collaborating with organizations like 350 Seattle and Green Seattle Partnership.
- \* EMT Program Sees Record High Enrollment Numbers North's Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) program received 166 applications for the EMT program for spring quarter, with 145 of those applicants testing for a limited 80 spots. This record-setting number speaks volumes about the growing reputation of the program as a premier EMT program in the community. Processes are continuously being streamlined and customer service to prospective students remains top of mind as the program becomes more competitive.
- \* Students Provide Free Tax Preparation Support to Community Fifteen current North students completed internships with the United Way of King County (UWKC) VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) program in winter quarter. The student interns assisted people in the community with free tax preparation. This is a service that is particularly beneficial for individuals and families who stand to benefit the most with this assistance. UWKC shared that they received glowing feedback from several of their managers about NSC students.
- \* Application Development BAS Program Fundraiser North's Application Development Bachelor of Applied Science program has established a scholarship for students and is seeking donations to support students in the program.
