- * International Business Case Competition at North this Saturday This Saturday, May 3, North will host the first annual International Business Case Competition. Students from all three Seattle Colleges will be presenting their case solutions to a panel of judges and competing for prize money. Check-in begins at 8:30 a.m. with the first round of presentations at 9 a.m.
- * Watch Technology Institute in Spotlight at New York Gala North's Watch Technology Institute and student Esther Yoo were among the honorees during the Horological Society of New York's (HSNY) gala event in March. HSNY is America's first watchmaking guild, and the black-tie event brought together 400 of the most influential figures in the watchmaking community. During the ceremony, the Watch Technology Institute was one of four recipients of the Howard Robbins Award for Watchmaking Schools, and Esther was one of six recipients of the Grace Fryer Scholarship for Female Watchmaking Students. - * North Partners with Microsoft for Al Bootcamp In partnership with Microsoft, North recently hosted a Learn for Educators Bootcamp focused on generative artificial intelligence (Al) training. The bootcamp was designed to equip North's instructional workforce with tools to effectively utilize generative Al, helping to streamline everyday tasks, such as creating or modifying a syllabus, lesson plans, quizzes, assignments and grading rubrics. North faculty and staff received a hands-on introduction to the power of generative Al for teaching. This provided a great opportunity for the college to deepen its partnership with Microsoft through this new Al project to train our educators, ultimately benefiting our students and the broader technology community as they enter the workforce. The expectation is that this investment will

help ensure North's success in adapting our educational work to stay current in a rapidly evolving tech environment.

* Rocketry Club Advises Middle Schoolers at Round Up – Four members of the NSC Rocketry Club participated in the Odle Middle School (Bellevue) Rocket Round Up event March 26. Outgoing club president Sicoya Bellis was joined by incoming club president Kelly Souza and club members Carolina Gutierrez and Drew Olson. All four helped with judging and advising on the middle school students' The American Rocketry Challenge (TARC)



rockets, as well as representing the rocketry club and North at their table. Learn more.

- * North BAS IB Students Use GWIL Practicum to Give Back Three Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) International Business (IB) students worked with the nonprofit Somali International Business Alliance (SIBA) during spring quarter for their Global Work Integrated Learning (GWIL) practicum. The students assisted SIBA by helping Somali refugees and other types of immigrants register their businesses. They also organized a clean air workshop at North for SIBA. Additionally, two BAS IB students worked with the nonprofit African Chamber of Commerce Pacific Northwest for their GWIL practicum. The students researched different initiatives, such as the adoption of port technology from Seattle to Senegal.
- * Workforce Programs Awarded \$60K in Direct Student Support North Workforce Programs was awarded \$60,000 in direct student support for work-based learning opportunities for the 2025-26 fiscal year. These funds were awarded through the Resource Allocation Process for the college's foundation funding. The funds will support two projects: it will compensate students who are doing unpaid internship experiences to fulfill credits for their program requirements; and compensation for students in the Application Development program who are working on real-life projects, including projects benefiting the campus community, such as the Licton Springs Review and Student Leadership events.
- * Efforts Underway to Launch Student Food Pantry North students experience a higher level of food insecurity than the national average, and studies have shown that students need to be fed healthy food on a regular basis to succeed in the classroom. NSC is launching a student food pantry to help students experiencing food insecurity. A grant from Student Leadership will help support the food pantry's needs, in addition to funds that are being collected to be spent on food for NSC students. Additionally, efforts are underway to build partnerships with local food advocacy groups and food banks to help spend the funds wisely.
- * NSC Art Gallery Show Gains Media Attention The NSC Art Gallery's recent show, 'The Unbearable Lightness of 300 Tons a Day,' which included work by 16 alumni from the past nine years of the Recology King County Artists in Residence program, has received a fair amount of media attention this spring. It was featured (with photos) in the April 15 Seattle Times story, "Seattle art exhibit turns our trash into works of art," and was also mentioned by Cascade PBS in an article highlighting art exhibits during Earth Month in the Seattle area.
- * Early Childhood Education Program Seeks Donations In 2022, North's Early Childhood Education (ECE) program launched a scholarship fund. This "homegrown" fund has received donations largely from college faculty and staff who believe in our mission. Donations support scholarships and other costs of attendance for students in our programs. Most of our students

work full time while in our program. Many are just above the qualification for financial aid, yet the cost of tuition and fees can be prohibitive without scholarship support. Your generous donations support these students in growing professionally in the field and improving their ability to support young children and their families. We offer programming in four different languages and are proud to say that the priority of the ECE Fund is to ensure that students in our language immersion programs are financially supported to meet their goals.
