\* Amor Zarate Named Golden Star Employee of the Quarter – Congratulations to Amor Zarate, student success specialist, Workforce Instruction, on receiving the NSC Golden Star Employee of the Quarter for Spring 2025. Amor was nominated for her "exemplary commitment to equity, strong professional ethics and tireless dedication to serving the Latinx

community." She also "provides support to students and families while actively advocating for their rights, ensuring their voices are heard and respected. Her work reflects a deep sense of social justice and a true spirit of community leadership."

\* North Student Named 2025 Martin Achievement Scholar – Ramon Cazarez, who is pursuing an Associate of Arts degree in Business at North, was one of

three Washington state community college students who received the 2025 Martin Family Foundation Achievement Scholarship. These scholars are selected early in their community college career and receive funds and support for their study and eventual transfer to the University of Washington. Individuals selected for the scholarship have demonstrated signs of exceptional ability in sciences, math,

\* Three Faculty Highlighted for Growing Spanish ECE Program – Workforce Instruction is highlighting three faculty who worked full-time in the '24-'25 school year teaching the growing Spanish Language Early Childhood Education program. Elidia Sangerman, Pia Barreto Johnson and Samatha Carrillo have worked to build the ECE program from a 12-credit certificate to Washington state's first bachelor of applied science degree offered fully in Spanish. In addition to contextualizing the curriculum to our student communities, the faculty team builds relationships with community partners and advocates for students across campus. They take part in a statewide workgroup focused on building capacity at other colleges to serve Spanish-speaking members of the workforce by providing mentoring, sharing resources and collaborating on advocacy. Additionally, they contribute to various committees at North Seattle, embedding themselves in the campus community.

\* **IT Faculty Recognized for Dedication and Innovation** – Workforce Instruction recognizes the dedication and innovation of IT faculty **Poul Nichols**. This year, he stepped into the role of IT faculty program coordinator and quickly became an integral leader, supporting student success while actively participating in Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) meetings. Among other achievements, Poul participated in the TLC's Pathways to Teaching Excellence series to enhance his course delivery, has adopted and prepared an open-source database textbook for IT 125, and has co-led two hands-on network cabling workshops during the Discover Seattle Colleges event. He also led the IT department's program review this past school year.

\* Interdisciplinary Collaboration Results in Creating New Program Pathway Map – An interdisciplinary collaboration resulted in the creation of an Ethics in Technology AA degree program pathway map. This is the result of work among three faculty, Anthony Ferrucci (Philosophy), Ana Villar (Library), and Bob Bunge (IT), and Molly Brown, director, Advising. This pathway meets requirements for the Associate of Arts Direct-Transfer Agreement (AA-DTA) degree with a concentration in Ethics in Technology. Students in this pathway develop skills in computational tools and theory, problem solving, analytical and critical thinking, ability to understand different perspectives, apply concepts in real world situations, interpret ideas, context of understanding advancement in technology and its relationship to human experience. The pathway is now available for students to select in their application.

\* North Class of '25 Honored During Commencement – North Seattle College honored the class of 2025 during the Seattle Colleges commencement ceremony June 20 at Alaska Airlines Arena on the University of Washington campus. Some 1,141 graduates completed their programs and earned a degree or certificate during a time in which students have faced many challenges. Learn more.

\* **Students' Research Showcased at UW Symposium** – Seventeen North students across eight teams presented their original research at the University of Washington's Undergraduate Research Symposium in May. Most of the students developed and implemented their research over the span of two or more quarters in North's Undergraduate Research course (UGR 294), team-taught by Biology faculty **Ann Murkowski** and Chemistry faculty **Heather Price**. \* **Program Paves Way with Math Course for Early Childhood Educators** – Members of North's Early Childhood Education program presented on the MATH 133, Math for Early Childhood Educators Course at the recent spring Early Childhood Teacher Prep Council retreat, a statewide gathering of faculty and staff. The course was launched a year ago in partnership with Childcare Aware through a Boeing grant and averaged a 91.7% completion rate in its pilot year. Other colleges are now working to pick up the course and North endeavors to help it become a statewide common course.

\* **North Partners with Seattle Fire Department Partnership** – Thanks to collaboration between NSC Internships and the Seattle Fire Department (SFD), North is now in its third year of partnership in which students in the Fire Science AAS degree program engage in curated job shadow opportunities with SFD. Students have the option of completing the job shadow experience to fulfill their required internship credits for the degree.

\* NSC Alum Speaks at UW College of Education Graduation – North alum <u>Raishawn</u> <u>Swensen</u>, who graduated from North in 2023 with a Bachelor of Applied Science degree in Early Childhood Education, was selected to speak at this year's University of Washington College of Education graduation celebration.
