## **RIBBETING NEWS**

\* Sen. Murray Holds Press Roundtable Event on DOE at North – North hosted a <u>roundtable</u> <u>discussion</u> on November 21 led by U.S. Sen. Patty Murray to address proposals that would disrupt the core and essential services of the Department of Education. North President Dr. Rachel Solemsaas participated as one of the panelists, along with Gina Topp, president, Seattle Public Schools; Melinda Dyer, retired state coordinator, McKinney-Vento Act; Rachel Gittleman, president, AFGE Local 252,

representing U.S. DOE employees; and Ann Simonson, Seattle-area mother of a daughter with disabilities. The event was covered by several local media outlets. Learn more.


- \* Electronics Networking Event for Students and Local Employers Representatives from local industry participated in a networking event for Electronics students at North on November 19. Students engaged with employers to learn about their organizations, the roles currently in demand that align with the Electronics program at North, and the associated qualifications. The event also provided students with valuable experience communicating their knowledge and skills in a professional setting. Following the event, employers shared overwhelmingly positive feedback regarding the quality of North's students and the strong alignment between the Electronics program and current workforce needs.
- \* New North Star Student Food Pantry Open The North Star Student Food Pantry is open and available to help students experiencing food insecurity. North students experience a higher level of food insecurity than the national average. Studies have shown that students need to be fed healthy food on a regular basis to succeed in the classroom. Located in College Center room 1452, students may shop once per week Monday through Thursday. There are a variety of nutritious options as well as hygiene articles available for all enrolled students.
- \* Entrepreneurship Program Receives Funding North was selected to receive approximately \$500,000 for the continuance and expansion of its entrepreneurship programs. This funding was stewarded by the Seattle Colleges Foundation and is granted by the generosity of an anonymous donor. Funds will allow the entrepreneurship programs to expand current partnerships, increase program offerings, and innovate with the opening of a Business and Technology Accelerator and the implementation of an intensive six-month program (Launch and Succeed as an Entrepreneur), which can result in impactful entrepreneurial solutions for Seattle Colleges district and the region.
- \* North Hosts Seattle Public Schools CCLCs North hosted Seattle Public Schools (SPS) Career Connected Learning Coordinators (CCLCs) for a professional development day on November 5. It featured presentations and tours of several Workforce Instruction programs, including Early Childhood Education, Business and Accounting, Information Technology and Computer Science, Pharmacy Technician, and Electronics. CCLCs teach career exploration courses at the high school and help connect high school teachers with career information and postsecondary training opportunities. Hosting the CCLCs on campus increases awareness of NSC's workforce focused programs while building ongoing partnerships with staff at each SPS high school to support future outreach efforts.
- \* Blood Drive a Success, Next Drive in February The November 3 blood drive at the Roy Flores Wellness Center was a success as 30 people from North came out and donated. This generosity helps save lives and shows the power of caring in our campus community. Stay tuned for the next blood drive, which will be on February 26.
- \* Cold and Flu Season is Here: Let's Stay Healthy Together This time of year often brings an uptick in respiratory illnesses like flu, RSV (respiratory syncytial virus) and the common cold, and we all play a role in keeping our campus and each other healthy. - \* North Awarded Five Scholarships from NASA Space Grant North is part of the Washington State NASA Space Grant Consortium. As part of this grant, five \$2,000 scholarships will be awarded by a committee of physics instructors to science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) students at North for the half-year starting spring quarter 2026. Awards will be disbursed by the end of winter quarter 2026. The scholarships encourage students to participate in undergraduate research and extracurricular STEM projects as part of their preparation for transferring

to four-year institutions. Not only do the scholarship students complete their STEM degrees at four-year

institutions, but they also are employed at many local high-tech firms, such as Blue Origin, Aerotek and Johnson Controls. This is the sixth year NSC has awarded these scholarships. For more information, please contact Tracy Furutani, faculty member, Math and Science.
