*** Johnson Controls Renews NSC Workforce Development Grant** – North received a \$100,000 grant for the fourth year – for a total of \$400,000 as part of the Johnson Controls Community College Partnership Program. The grant is part of Johnson Controls nationwide initiative that aims to donate up to \$15 million to community colleges by the end of 2026 to expand access to high-demand technical fields. The funding strengthens on-campus training and educational pathways for emerging leaders in the HVAC, digital, fire and security sectors. In partnership with Johnson Controls, the global leader in smart, healthy and sustainable buildings, North Seattle College continues to invest strategically in closing the skilled trades gap. 


* **Microsoft Awards North an Additional \$25K for Tech Bachelor's Programs** – North has been awarded another \$25,000 in support of integrating AI tools in education and the college's upcoming student capstone showcase. The funds will be managed and utilized by NSC's technology bachelor's programs. Microsoft is investing about \$4 billion in a large philanthropy initiative called Elevate with the goal of democratizing AI and training about 20 million people to develop AI skills. North aims to pursue more funding opportunities with Microsoft in an effort to help career-seeking students across all workforce sectors represented at the college – from Early Childhood Education to Real Estate to Pharmacy Technology and beyond.

* **Article Accepted for Publication in League for Innovation Learning Abstracts** – North's Early Childhood Education staff and faculty members have had an article accepted for publication in the May 2026 issue of the League for Innovation's Learning Abstracts. The article is titled "Advancing Anti-Bias Competency Through Cohort-Based Learning and Strategic Partnerships in Early Childhood Education." The article highlights the ECE program's Bachelor of Applied Science and their work to develop equity-informed teachers.

* **International Accounting Features Executive Speakers** – North's Accounting with International Accounting program started a new initiative featuring Boeing executives who shared global accounting insights and answered student questions. This partnership improved the course for students by providing real-world expertise and expanded students' exposure to industry leaders. Both the speakers and students found it to be beneficial and expressed interest in continuing in the coming quarters.
