\* **February is Black History Month** – This year marks the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of federal recognition for Black Americans. What began as a singular week of learning and recognition called Negro History Week in 1926 has grown into an overall cultural observance of Black History throughout the month of February. In 1925, when Dr. Carter G. Woodson planned the inaugural week-long observance of Black history, he could hardly have anticipated the imprint he would leave on the world. For the 100<sup>th</sup> theme, the founders of Black History Month urge us to explore the impact and meaning of Black history and life commemorations in transforming the status of Black peoples in the modern world. \* **What to Do if You Encounter Federal Agency** – Across the district, work is actively continuing to ensure clarity and consistency in our practices related to the possibility of federal agencies showing up on campuses. If you encounter a federal agency – including ICE – stay calm and contact Security at (206) 934-3636. For most situations, reaching out to North's campus security officers will be sufficient and is the appropriate first step. Our security team is trained in responding to these situations and will work directly with federal officers as needed. They will also contact additional college or district leaders when appropriate. \* **Capital Projects Update** – A major focus of recent capital efforts has been heating and cooling improvements across campus. Three new boilers and new fans were installed in the Arts and Sciences building, and HVAC improvements are underway in the College Center building. Other improvements include lighting repairs along most of the main stairway from College Way to the courtyard, improving visibility and safety. In addition, failing doors in the Opportunity Center were recently replaced. Exploratory work is being done for a future campus badge-access system. All these projects represent critical investments in campus infrastructure and long-term reliability.

\* **Campus Security Cameras Installed** – North has completed installation of campus security cameras, marking a major milestone after more than two years of planning and coordination. Cameras are primarily located outdoors and in the parking garage. They are expected to be operational by the end of winter quarter, significantly enhancing safety and providing greater peace of mind for our campus and surrounding community.
