

## **Associate of Fine Arts Degree: Art**

Candidates for the Associate of Fine Arts degree must complete a minimum of 100 college-level courses (numbered 100 and above) with a grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 or higher.

The Associate of Fine Arts (AFA) degree certifies completion of approved course work. It is suitable for students currently working in art. Students seeking a Bachelor of Arts or a Bachelor of Fine Arts should consult North AA degree requirements, their art and campus advisor and the university in which they intend to enroll about admission equivalency requirements. Since university requirements for admission may change annually, the students must keep themselves informed of these changes.

The AFA: Art requires General Education courses as follows: ENGL& 101 and 102; and one of the following computation courses: MATH&107 or above, BUS 116, ACCT 110 or above. Students must also complete 15 credits in the three areas of Knowledge: 5 - from Visual, Literary, and Performing Arts other than ART courses; 5 - from Individuals Cultures and Society, and 5 - from the Natural World. There are also 45 required ART credits and a minimum of 25 ART elective credits. Some of the art courses are offered only once a year, so students should double check to be sure a course will be offered. During the final quarter, students must submit a portfolio of work of 15-20 pieces for evaluation. The art faculty will work with the student to provide exact details on portfolio preparation and will review and vote on acceptability toward the degree.

Two quarters before planning to graduate, all AFA students in art must consult with and choose three faculty that will mentor them in building their portfolio. It is recommended that all studio art courses be taken in sequence. Substitutions may be made only with the approval of the art faculty and Arts, Humanities & Social Sciences Dean. Requests for such substitutions must be made formally through an instructor who, if they approve, will submit a "Request for Academic Exception" form once the student has passed the course.

Listed on the following page is a possible course sequence for the AFA degree in Art; however, it may be necessary to take course out of sequence as the quarterly schedule dictates. For more information about program or the annual schedule contact the Humanities Division at (206) 934-3709.

#### Here are steps to follow if you want an Associate of Fine Arts Degree or Certificate in Fine Arts:

- 1. Obtain and read the college brochure about the A.F.A. Degree and Certificates in Fine Arts.
- 2. Obtain, read, and begin to complete the program planning worksheet for the appropriate A.F.A. or C.F.A. You may obtain these program worksheets from the AHSS division office.
- 3. After you have filled out the program planning sheet, by relying on actual transcripts of your courses here and elsewhere, make an appointment with your art instructor. (All the full-time art instructors are advisors). You need to talk with a faculty advisor early in your study so that you know which courses you must take in order to receive a degree or certificate.
- 4. If you have transferred here from another school and you wish to have credits from other colleges apply to your A.F.A or C.F.A., refer to <u>https://northseattle.edu/credentials</u>. Request that your official and sealed transcript(s) be sent to the ARRC office.
- 5. In approximately two weeks, check with the ARRC to see if your transcripts have arrived. (206) 934-3663 or arrc@seattlecolleges.edu.

- 6. As soon as your transcripts have arrived, complete the "Application for Evaluation of Transfer Credits." This form is obtainable at the front counter of the ARRC office. Be sure to indicate the program for which you are requesting transfer credit. Once the ARRC evaluator has received your transcripts and your application for evaluation of transfer credits within 4-6 weeks. You will receive an email with a link to your degree audit where you can see how your credits have been evaluated.
- 7. When you have completed 30 credits toward the Certificate of Fine Arts or 45 credits toward the Associate of Fine Arts, make an appointment to see the head of Art Department so that your progress may be evaluated and a continuing plan toward your graduation can be created. When you meet with the head of the Art Department, it is essential that you have completed step 6. Bring all your transcripts.
- 8. AFA only: At least two quarters before you plan to graduate, you must choose three faculty to work with on preparing your portfolio. It is your responsibility to meet with your faculty on a regular basis to check your progress and to ensure your portfolio meets the standards.
- 9. When you are registered in your last quarter's classes toward the degree or certificate, you should obtain an "Application for Graduation" form, obtainable at the front counter of ARRC, and ask your faculty to sign and submit it on your behalf.
- 10. Graduate, and Congratulations!

## **AFA PORTFOLIO GUIDELINES**

Our department coordinator will hold quarterly informational sessions for all students interested in the AFA. An AFApursing student must attend these sessions. The student will need to establish the 3 faculty whom they want to evaluate their portfolio early in the year, at least 2 quarters before graduating. Those faculty will guide the student in building a strong portfolio.

Guidelines for the AFA portfolio:

The AFA portfolio consists of an Artist Statement, Artist Resume and 15-20 images of your strongest work. You must include 3-5 examples of foundational work, which demonstrate an understanding of 2-dimensional design, and color. The remaining 10-17 images should showcase your main area(s) of focus.

The student will create a physical portfolio with plastic sleeves to hold well-printed images of student's work and a CD with the digital images of the same work. The student will create two sets of portfolios, one that the college will keep.

#### **DIGITAL PORTFOLIO:**

Image format: .jpg Image size: 1920 pixels on the longest side Image resolution: 300 dpi File name: # of order in portfolio\_last name\_first name\_year of graduation\_abbreviated title or brief description. i.e. 1\_smith\_john\_2014\_still life with skull The CD must have a sleeve or thin case and be stored with the physical portfolio. Include statement and resume as .pdf files

#### **PHYSICAL PORTFOLIO:**

Black portfolio case with plastic sleeves. Any size between 8.5 x 11" and 11 x 14". Read left to right. If vertical, top of image must be at the top of page, if horizontal, top of image must be on left side of page. Font style and font size must be uniform throughout. Use a simple font (e.g. Calibri, Arial, 14pt.). Must include cover page with your full name, year of graduation and contact email and phone. The title, medium, dimensions and date should occupy the same placement for each image e.g. in the bottom right corner.

Remember that the work should speak for itself and the portfolio should not be ornate, or decorated.

The images should be printed on high quality paper from a high quality printer. The images must be well-lit and extremely clear. Blurred or poorly-lit images will not be accepted. The printed image should match the original image in terms of color and clarity.

Portfolios will not be accepted if they do not follow the above guidelines. Faculty will need to check that BOTH portfolio sets meet the above standards.

Student is responsible for communicating with their chosen faculty and setting up meeting times. Faculty and student will work together to make sure portfolio is finished and meets all criteria before student applies for graduation.
