- * North to Host Research and Planning Commission Conference North Seattle College will be hosting the spring 2023 conference of the Research and Planning Commission (RPC) April 13-14. The Research and Planning Commission is made up of institutional research and effectiveness personnel from across the Washington state community and technical college system. - * Sustainability Effort to Save Thousands of Gallons of Water Each Month Plans are underway for McKinstry to install a new water filtration system with a UV light to kill bacteria in the Health Science and Student Resources building. The new system will allow restoring the original water reclamation system that supplies water to all restroom toilets and urinals in the building. Water is collected from roof drains and stored in three 5,000-gallon cisterns in the garage. The water is pumped through large filters, then past a UV light to sterilize the water. This system will save thousands of gallons of water each month. Seattle Public Utilities is studying the system to see if it can offer a rebate for up

to 50% of the installation cost, which has never been offered to anyone in Washington.

- * Wellness Center Memberships Available Memberships to the Roy Flores Wellness Center are available to all students, employees and community members. All for-credit students have memberships automatically via their tuition, so it is already paid. Please help spread the word to students about this great resource! Employees and community members who wish to join should visit the front desk at the wellness center to pick up a membership form, pay at the cashier's office, and return to the center with a receipt. Alternatively, employees can complete a payroll deduction form. Employee memberships are \$50 per quarter (\$8.30 per paycheck) and community memberships are \$100 per quarter.
- * Construction Updates Here is an update on current campus construction projects:
 - <u>Library</u> Construction is focused on HVAC in the west side tower and roof.
 Electrical switch gear was delayed but is expected to arrive this week. The new replacement elevator has been confirmed (original scope was to use old elevator with new electronics). Long lead times continue to be an issue as the project moves along. We are still on track for substantial completion on June 15.
 - <u>Classroom Renovations</u> We are working on replacing the carpet on the third floor of the Instruction (IB) and College Center buildings and updating all furniture to meet ADA standards. This will be a huge undertaking, but we expect to work on approximately five classrooms each day to minimize the impact to our students and faculty. Contractors have submitted bids, and the Washington State

- Department of Enterprise Services and Facilities will be going over them next week to award the project to a contractor and place our furniture order. More details to follow as we narrow the scope of work and timeline.
- Water Reclamation The Health Sciences and Student Resources building has three 5,000-gallon cisterns that collect rainwater from the roof drains (see item above). This water is then supplied to all the toilets and urinals in the building to save water. Unfortunately, shortly after the building was opened, it was discovered that the system wasn't up to code, forcing the stoppage of it. We have used the remaining contingency funds from the Energy Service Company (ESCO) project to get this water reclamation system up to code and restore this sustainable water supply system. The system will be operational spring quarter, but we don't expect much use of rainwater until mid-fall quarter.
- <u>Facilities Update</u> Elevators one and two in the IB building have new door hardware ordered. This work is scheduled to be completed during spring break. Facilities has been working closely with the electrical contractor for switchgear repairs in the Arts & Sciences building. We have a solution for replacing the switchgear in the A&S building and getting us restored to City Light power. If the City approves the plan, we could be restored as early as May.
