May is Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander Heritage Month: In 1992, Congress established May as Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month to coincide with two key milestones: the arrival of the nation's first Japanese immigrants (May 7, 1843) and Chinese workers' pivotal role in building the transcontinental railroad (completed May 10, 1869). In 2021, a presidential proclamation expanded this to include

Native Hawaiians. The theme for 2023's observance is "Advancing Leaders through Opportunity." This is a continuation of the "Advancing Leaders" theme series which began in 2021, and further highlights efforts to advance leaders in federal government. (Sources: Census.gov and FAPAC.org.)

Construction Updates: Here is an update on current campus construction projects:

- <u>Library</u>: The architect is investigating options and cost for hardscape seating, revitalizing
 existing planters and a possible terrarium on the east side of the library where the old
 abandoned fountains remain. The first week of July is targeted for the college to access
 the second and third floors for installing furniture, IT, etc. We are targeting college
 access to the first floor and ground level for their installations in mid-August. Substantial
 completion is scheduled for the first week in September, and we're still on track to open
 the library for fall quarter.
- <u>Classroom Renovations:</u> Due to time constraints and the impact of moving so many classes at once, we have limited our carpet replacement to the first floor of the Instruction Building while replacing furniture in classrooms on the third floor of College Center. We'll continue to replace carpet on the third floor of the Instruction Building and College Center in summer quarter to minimize the impact to faculty and students.
- <u>Water Reclamation:</u> Unfortunately, we discovered several minor issues with this system
 that required us to restore this system back to city water until repairs can be made. We
 currently have a plan to make repairs and adjustments; we're awaiting new parts, filters
 and updated software to restore this system back to full operation using water collected
 from the roof drains of the HSSR.
- <u>Facilities Update:</u> A window in the northwest corner of the HSSR building shattered; the
 area has been taped off for safety precautions. We're currently awaiting the arrival of a
 custom replacement. Once our vendor has the replacement on site, we'll schedule
 installation. We now have two failed ADA door operators in the HSSR building. Parts
 are on back order; we'll make repairs shortly after their arrival. Thank you for everyone's
 patience as we address these issues.

AROUND THE DISTRICT

Winter Quarter Enrollment Up: Enrollment figures for Winter Quarter 2023 are in, and the Seattle Colleges District reported increases in State, Running Start and Total FTEs over the previous year's results. For Total FTEs, North was up 4% over Winter 2022, while the District was up 6% overall. For State-Funded FTEs, North was up 2%, while the District was up 5% overall. For Running Start FTEs, North was up 5%, while the District was up 2% overall. One area that did not show an increase was International FTEs, where North was down 9%, while the District was down 11% overall.

IN THE NEWS

North Students Take Top Honors over U.S. Universities in IB Competition: North Seattle College, the only community college team in a field of research universities, was the winner of the National Association of Small Business International Trade Educators (NASBITE) International's recent 2023 Student Case Competition. The team consisted of Theresa LaRue, Blaine M. Relatado, Alex Soares and Christian Dela Torre, and advisor Honorio Todino, PhD. North beat runner-up Michigan State University, one of the nation's top research universities in international business. North has competed the last three years and is the only institution to be a finalist each time. Way to go, team! Learn more.

NSC Students, Watch Technology Institute Honored at New York Gala: North's Watch Technology Institute was well-represented at the Horological Society of New York's 157th anniversary Gala & Awards Ceremony in April. The society honored 20 watchmaking students and four U.S. watchmaking schools. Five students from North were among the 20 receiving awards: Kent Beckley, Samuel D.H. Mallow, Kevin Zamani, A Reum Im and Michael
