\* **Jill Lane to Serve as Acting President** – Interim Chancellor for Seattle Colleges Dr. Rosie Rimando-Chareunsap recently announced the appointment of **Jill Lane** (pictured) to serve in the role of executive leader for the duration of the interim president search at North. As announced in April,

President Dr. Chemene Crawford accepted the role of president at Everett Community College. Her last official day at North will be June 30. Jill will begin serving as acting president of North on July 1. In her message to the North community about the transition plan, Dr. Rimando-Chareunsap said Jill's leadership of the accreditation process and building community in preparation for the visit are evident. Her 18-plus year history at North and the "deep dive" work that the accreditation process required will serve her well as she steps into the role. Dr. Rimando-Chareunsap stated her goal is to identify and have an interim president in place at North by Sept. 1.

\* **Announcing 'Newest' Permanent Members of Instructional Dean Team** – Vice President of Instruction Pete Lortz recently announced that North has two new permanent instructional deans:

- **Dr. Melana Yanos** has accepted the permanent dean of Workforce Instruction position after serving as the interim dean for more than a year. She supervises an instructional division consisting of 17 diverse workforce programs and more than 140 faculty and staff.
- Dr. Daniel Tarker has accepted the permanent dean of Library and Learning Supports position, having led North's Student Learning Center, Teaching & Learning Center, and Library and Learning Support Services as interim associate dean. He began working in community colleges more than 25 years ago at Hartnell College, a Hispanic Serving Institution nestled among the vibrant green fields of the Salinas Valley on California's Central Coast.

\* New I-BEST Program for Pharmacy Technology Students – A new offering through the Integrated Basic Education & Skills Training (I-BEST) program for Pharmacy Technology will be available for students in summer quarter 2023. The Basic and Transitional Studies and Workforce Instruction divisions are collaborating to launch the team-taught and navigator-supported course AMA 117, Medical Terminology. This will be the first health/medical I-BEST program at North Seattle College since Medical Assisting and Phlebotomy moved to Seattle Central College.

\* **Biomedical Program Receives Funding for New Equipment** – NSC's Biomedical Technology program in the Electronics Engineering Technology department received an industry grant, in the amount of \$970, through the Washington State Biomedical Association, which will be used to acquire essential medical equipment. The Biomed program will receive an MD-6000 Bladder Scanner and two Ethicon Endo-Surgery equipment carts. By using these resources together, students can simulate real-world scenarios, enhancing their technical skills and decision-making capabilities. This hands-on experience is invaluable in bridging the gap between theoretical knowledge and practical application, ultimately ensuring students are fully prepared to excel in their future roles in the biomedical technology field.

\* ECE Partnership with Childcare Aware on Boeing Math Equity Grant – Staff and faculty members from NSC's Early Childhood Education (ECE) program are working to develop a math course that is specific to ECE and would meet the state QSR requirement (college level math at 100 or higher). The project aims to increase math pass rates, shorten the math pathway for all ECE students — especially BIPOC students, improve early childhood educator's math confidence and enhance practical math skills as educators. The partnership is utilizing a liberatory design framework to develop the new course with members of the workforce.

\* Construction Updates – Here is an update on current campus construction projects:

- <u>Library</u> Facilities met with Olympic Storage and Moving to walk the newly renovated library and meet with staff about materials that need to be packed and delivered. Lincoln Construction is targeting the first week of July for the college to access the third floor, the first week of August for the second floor and mid-August for access to the first floor and ground level. Substantial completion is scheduled for the first week in September, and everything is still on track to open for fall quarter 2023.
- <u>Classroom Renovations</u> Construction for the first floor of the Instruction Building began on May 22 and is just about to wrap up. A huge thank-you to all EMT and Pharmacy staff and

students for their patience during the construction. This work would not have been possible without their assistance and cooperation. Carpet and ceiling tiles have been replaced in 14 classrooms, including the 1311/1411 passthrough lounge. Furniture for the third-floor classrooms is scheduled to be delivered the week of June 19. We'll continue to replace carpet on the third floor of the Instruction Building (IB) and College Center in the next biennium (summer/winter quarter) to minimize the impact on faculty and students.

- <u>Water Reclamation</u> Several minor issues were discovered with the system that required Facilities to restore it to city water until repairs can be made. A plan is in place to make repairs and adjustments. Facilities is awaiting new parts, filters and updated software to restore the system back to full operation using water collected from the roof drains of the Health Sciences and Student Resources (HSSR) building.
- <u>Facilities Update</u> A window in the northwest corner of the HSSR building shattered, and the area was taped off as a safety precaution. Facilities is working with a vendor to schedule the installation. Facilities also received a tracking number for the ADA door operator parts needed for the same building. Installation of these parts will start shortly after their arrival. Thank you for everyone's patience as these issues are addressed.
