About the AA-DTA With An Emphasis In Psychology Pathway

This pathway meets requirements for the Associate of Arts - Direct Transfer Agreement (AA-DTA) with an emphasis in Psychology.. Completion of this degree opens doors to entry level employment in many sectors including non-profit, social work, healthcare, education, business, and government. It also allows you to transfer at the junior level into a Psychology program at a four-year college or university.

Students in this pathway develop an awareness of human behavior and thinking that will serve them in both personal and professional capacities. Other skills that are developed in psychology are: scientific literacy in reading and writing, critical thinking, familiarity with research, interpersonal awareness, group communication and collaboration, problem solving skills, information-finding skills, and time management. Competencies in these areas consistently rank at the top of employer wish lists.

- A Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) degree at one of the Seattle Colleges.

North Seattle College has direct transfer agreements with four-year institutions throughout Washington state, including the University of Washington, Washington State University, and Seattle University. Psychology graduates from North have also transferred to out-of-state institutions.
