



Suggested Schedule to Sociology AADTA

This pathway meets requirements for the Associate of Arts-Direct Transfer Agreement (AA-DTA) with an emphasis in Sociology. This sample schedule assumes a fall start. If you wish to take alternate courses not listed below please meet with a North advisor to confirm you're still meeting AA-DTA degree requirements.

Before You Start

To Do

Quarter 1

- Schedule an appointment with your assigned advisor in [Starfish](#) to meet and discuss your goals.

- Check out campus life: student clubs, Equity & Welcome Center, Fall Fest, etc.
- Drop by the [Library](#) to get help with research; check out resources; access computers and study space; and create media projects.

Quarter 2

- Create an educational plan with your assigned advisor.
- Apply for financial aid for the upcoming academic year in Winter or Spring quarter to maximize your funding options.
- Explore sociology-related internships with North's Internship Coordinator.
- Attend transfer fair and workshops.

Quarter 3

- Visit potential universities and determine application deadlines.
- Apply for the Seattle Colleges Foundation Scholarship and other scholarships.
- Consider Student Leadership positions and other on-campus jobs.
- Research and develop a list of four-year colleges and universities.
- Attend "Making Learning and Teaching Visible" campus event every Spring.
- Attend campus lectures and forums from the Arts, Humanities & Social Sciences division.

Quarter 4

- Update your educational plan with your assigned advisor.
- Contact Sociology department at potential universities.
- Attend transfer workshops and a transfer fair.
- Write your personal statement for university applications.
- Apply for financial aid for the next academic year to maximize your funding options.

Quarter 5

- Apply to universities or colleges and scholarships.
- Explore sociology-related internships with North's Internship Coordinator.
- Check out the American Sociological Association and Pacific Sociological Association.

Quarter 6

- Apply for graduation for the AA-DTA degree with your assigned advisor.
- Check in with university for transfer plan.
- Order cap and gown for commencement and join alumni association.
- Attend on-campus graduation fair and commencement ceremony.



About the Sociology Map

This pathway meets requirements for the Associate of Arts–Direct Transfer Agreement (AA-DTA) with an emphasis in Sociology. Completion of this degree opens doors to a variety of careers in sectors including non-profit, business, government, marketing, advertising, social justice, and education. It also allows you to transfer at the junior level into a Sociology program at a four-year college or university.

Students in this pathway think from a systems perspective, broaden their worldview, and become thoughtful citizens of the world. Students develop skills in analysis and research, multicultural awareness, computer and technical literacy, group communication and collaboration, interpersonal communication, institutional analysis, critical thinking, and reading and writing skills.

- A Bachelor's degree in Sociology or a related field at a four-year college or university.
- A Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) degree at one of the Seattle Colleges.

North Seattle College has direct transfer agreements with four-year institutions throughout Washington state, including the University of Washington, Washington State University, and Seattle University. Sociology graduates from North have also transferred to out-of-state institutions.

Program and admissions requirements vary from college-to-college. Contact an advisor to create an educational plan tailored to transfer to the institution of your choice.
